
Update from Lou Latter - Chair of Rugby Development

While schools and colleges will be slightly more advanced than clubs due to their activity guidance that begins on 8th March, rugby clubs will be able to do limited contact training and Ready4Rugby matches against other clubs from 29th March. Do watch Steve Grainger's video, which provides more information and keep an eye on the Coronavirus resources on the RFU website which will have updated FAQs and everything you need to get ready for the end of March.

Middlesex will be running an All-Clubs meeting on Thursday 11th March at 7pm to talk clubs through the new Return to Rugby Roadmap. Please let Andy know if you wish to attend.

In February, we communicated with clubs that Middlesex had taken the decision to cancel all Age Grade festivals for the remainder of this season. This will remain in place until further notice. This will include:

- Middlesex U12 Boys Competition
- Middlesex Minis festivals (U7 U11)
- Middlesex St George's Day Girls festival
- All requests for clubs to host festivals
- In line with RFU guidance, tours will not be approved

We are currently finalising the Age Grade Calendar for the 2021-2022 season and aim to have this out to clubs and schools by the end of March.

In preparation of rugby returning, please do let Andy and I know who your COVID Manager is so that we can ensure clubs are receiving the most up-to-date guidance and details around returning to rugby activity.

As a reminder there is a lot of information in the <u>Club</u> Support Centre on the England Rugby website.

Update from Andrew Smart - Chair of Competitions

Finally, as expected on Friday the RFU did provide the first guidance on how rugby will run from the 29th March. It was a most comprehensive circulation which deals with the proposed timetable, includes an updated Return to Community Rugby Roadmap and an informative video from Steve Grainger, the RFU Director of Development. For those of you who have not yet had an opportunity to see the circulation or video I attach the link Community rugby set to return from 29 March (englandrugby.com) Peter, this needs a link

The headline dates are as follows - these are the earliest possible and are totally reliant on each of the four tests set out in the Government's roadmap being achieved.

- Stage D1. 29th March contact training (no scrums or mauls) with clubs able to play each under Ready4Rugby regulations
- Stage D2. 26th April contact training (no scrums or mauls) with clubs able to play each other under the adapted laws
- Stage E1. 17th May full contact training including scrums and mauls
- Stage E2. 31st May Full contact matches
- Stage F. June 21st All restrictions both on and off field will be removed

Clearly some good news at last and every indication that the expectation is that we will be on for a full, restriction free 2021/22 season both on and off the field for both Leagues and Merit Tables.

That only leaves us to consider what to do about the rest of this season working within the restrictions and dates above. First of all, I need to establish the expectations of our clubs and see what I can do to support and fulfil those expectations.

Hopefully you would have seen last week that in anticipation of the announcement, Louise and I have organised an All-Clubs meeting for this Thursday 11th March at 7pm to help clubs prepare for this return and to cover any questions or issues that will might arise. The meeting will also explore what options we as a CB have to do to provide meaningful rugby for those clubs who want to play matches, whether it be under adapted laws or the Ready4Rugby format.

I hope very much that clubs will support the meeting and enable me to get a flavour from as wide a selection of clubs and teams as possible, of what you want and have a full discussion about what we can provide. I have some ideas, but it would be good to get some feedback to see if there is any support.

I then intend to communicate with all our clubs following the meeting with our plans. I have already started speaking to the London Society of Referees to see if they are in a position to support us. We have a













little bit of time as although we return to rugby from the 29th March, which is a Monday, we go into Easter and so reasonably the first time that anyone might be looking for competition, at this stage under R4R it, will be the weekend of the 10/11th April.

I absolutely understand that some of our players and clubs are simply not interested in the R4R format and some probably are not interested in playing under the Adapted Laws. I will do what I can to provide offerings that support your club's desires

Update from Andrew Smart - Chair of Groups

Of the four group meetings due to be held in late January/early February, only the North West meeting went ahead. It was a pretty good meeting identifying some common themes across the participating clubs. Generally, they all reported that they were in decent financial shape but all raised concerns about engaging with their players since the introduction of the third lockdown. Hopefully the news last Friday concerning the return to rugby roadmap, leading ultimately to the relaxation of all restrictions both on and off the field for next season will hopefully in the short term see clubs able to re-engage successfully with their members and players as the opportunities open up for training and playing R4R from the 29th March and then Adapted Laws from the 26th April.

Despite the lack of rugby activity during this third lockdown we have been quite busy with the Government's £23 million Winter Survival Funding for both grants and/or loans, making sure that all our clubs are aware of the funding opportunities and providing support and advice when asked. As it turned out the criteria for applying for the grant proved pretty tough for most of our clubs. In the end only thirteen were able to apply and let's hope that they will all prove successful. The requirements for loans is simply an expression of interest at this stage. I am told that the uptake amongst our clubs was much more significant than for the grants although I don't yet have the numbers. A most worthwhile exercise and the relationships and contacts built up over the last year as we have faced this pandemic proved instrumental in getting the information out quickly and to the right people at our clubs

Thanks to Rob Bruce, the treasurer of Enfield Ignatians, who reported that his club had been successful in obtaining Tier 2, 3 and 4 business grants and that he had also been told to expect their lockdown 3 funding. They are the first club that I am aware of, certainly in the county, to have secured this Tier funding and must give hope that our other clubs paying business rates will also benefit. I have already made application for all this funding on behalf of my club and where applicable I suggest that you do the same.

For those clubs who might also benefit it might help to have the relevant dates:

- Tier 2 from 2nd December
- Tier 3 from the 16th December
- Tier 4 from 20th December and Lockdown 3 from the 5th January

Finally, hopefully you will all have seen the circulation last week of an All Clubs meeting this Thursday 11th March at 7pm. Agenda and Zoom invitation details to follow. We have these now, can that sentence be modified? I have covered some of the main reasons for holding the meeting in my Competitions report, so I won't duplicate them here. Suffice to say that the meeting can only be successful if you attend and make a contribution. We need to know what you want for your club for the rest of the season and what you expect of the County.

Representative Playing and Coaching Update

Age grade rugby representative programme has been cancelled, which allows clubs to concentrate through the RFU road map in keeping players engaged with their clubs.

There is a girls U15s & U18s discussion forum taking place on Monday 15th March, our U15s & U18s management teams have been in attendance on a













number of these meetings and the idea of these meetings is to assist in the planning of girl's rugby. The Meetings are chaired by the RFU Playing Pathways Manager.

The Age Grade Playing Calendar for season 2021/2022 has been completed. Next season the U18s run from Nov - Dec. U17s post Xmas - U15s/U16s in May alongside the academy DPP.

Interviews for the position of Chair of Representative Playing will be held on Thursday 18th March.

London Irish Developing Playing Programme (DPP) & Academy Update

Summary points include:

- The Developing Player Programme (DPP) has been delayed until Easter
- There have been 4 London Irish Academy players named in the England U20s squad
- 7 Academy players invited to the England U18s development camp
- 6 Academy Players made their first appearances for the 1st team since the summer. An U18 made his debut for London Irish at Leicester in the Premiership last Friday evening
- Coach Development sessions taking place monthly online, with tutor John Bates
- The Scouting network which develops coaches to work in the DPP, have vacancies for suitable coaches, those interested Middlesex coaches please get in touch and I will forward you details
- Next Middlesex / London Irish RPPG meeting will take place on Friday 26th March.

Coaching Development

There have been online coaching webinars running monthly this season. They have covered various themes and have been specific to various coaches from Minis / Youth, Club Coaches, Level 3 Coaches and Female coaches. The plan is to continue with the online Webinars up to May, with various themes around sharing ideas for the remainder of this season and player preparation for next season
