Update from Lou Latter - Chair of Rugby Development

One week and counting until rugby returns.

As a reminder, you can find all the information around the latest Return to Rugby Roadmap in the a Coronavirus resources section on the RFU website which will have updated FAQs and everything you need to get ready for 29th March. There is also a lot of information in the **Club Support Centre** on the England Rugby website.

Thank you to everyone that attended the All Clubs Meeting on 11th March and apologies once again for those that couldn't access the meeting. We weren't expecting such a large turnout and are looking at increasing our online meeting capacity for when we schedule the next meeting in a few weeks' time.

The next meeting will hopefully cover off-field guidance, although the RFU are still in discussions with DCMS and Government on what this will mean. What we do know is:

- Changing rooms and showers CANNOT be used as of 29th March.
- We believe that Toilets will be able to open (still awaiting confirmation on this) but there may be guidance around this.
- Clubhouses CANNOT be opened from 29th March, and it is anticipated that they will fall in line with hospitality guidance.
- The RFU are also still waiting on guidance around travel dos and don'ts.

Stage D1 does allow contact training, and this should not exceed 20 minutes each session. For age grade rugby maximum group sizes have been replaced with

coach to player resources so please do read through the Stage D guidance.

So key dates for the diary: 29th March – Rugby returns at Stage D1 9th April - RFU to communicate summer/out-of-season activity 26th April – Move to Stage D2 31st May - Age Grade Season ends

We will also be sending out the 2021-2022 Age Grade Calendar to clubs by the end of the month.

Update from Andrew Smart - Chair of Competitions

Very little from the RFU since their big announcement about the Return to Rugby except they issued their Stage D1 and D2 Guide to Activitym, highlighting that "initial training sessions should focus on building players general fitness levels and rugby skill development along with non-contact game play such as Tag, Touch and Ready4Rugby. Contact training activities should be introduced incrementally, building up to a maximum of 20 minutes duration per session."

On a CB briefing on Friday Steve Grainger emphasised that the RFU is still awaiting guidance from Government on changing rooms, showers, re-opening of club houses, spectators and travel although he was confident that it would be fairly imminent. One thing he was able to confirm was there was to be an announcement on the 9th April on Summer Activity and what was to be allowed for both adult and age group and to include a training and playing programme.













I think it is probably worth reinforcing the headline dates for the Return to Rugby, again reiterating that they are the earliest possible and are totally reliant on each of the four tests set out in the Government's roadmap being achieved.

Stage D1. 29th March - contact training (no scrums or mauls) with clubs able to play each under Ready4Rugby regulations

Stage D2. 26th April - contact training (no scrums or mauls) with clubs able to play each other under the adapted laws

Stage E1. 17th May - full contact training including scrums and mauls

Stage E2. 31st May – Full contact matches

Stage F. - June 21st - All restrictions both on and off field will be removed

It was pretty clear from those clubs that were able to get on the All-Clubs meeting that they preferred to organise their own fixtures rather than rely on me to do it for them. The consultation will continue although it will be as much focused on identifying those clubs who will no longer have access to their pitches and facilities from the end of April but would like to continue to train and play across May and at the same time identify clubs, with access to their facilities, who would be happy to accommodate those clubs without. There will be some limited financial support for those clubs who have to incur costs to continue to train and play.

Finally, prompted to be fair by Old Isleworthians, who are still very keen to play their MT Vase Final put over from last season I will be speaking to those clubs who reached finals at the end of the 2019/20 season to see if they wish to contest those finals at the beginning of next season. I have the plaques and match balls, but I have lost my funding to cover match officials, hospitality and postmatch food which was diverted into the Immediate Support Fund to support our clubs across the pandemic. Still if the clubs are prepared to work around those issues, I will look to organise those finals on the first Saturday in September.

I will be contacting the relevant clubs during this week to see what the appetite is for playing those matches

First of all, an apology. I have to put my hands up and say I was in no way expecting the numbers we got for the meeting reaching the 100 people capacity just as we were starting. When Louise and I caught up earlier in the week to agree the agenda and how we were going to manage the meeting I rather jokingly said that I hoped that we would reach 100 but to be honest I had no real expectation that we would reach that figure let alone the 50 others who were not able to get on. I should have thought about it but did not and we will have to accept that despite the outstanding numbers we failed to get the message that we wanted out to all the people who wanted to hear it and I very much take the point raised by Geoff Payne that despite the availability of video, notes etc. they are of less use if you are unable to get on and contribute.

There were any number of lessons to be learnt and I am sure that I speak for Louise when I say we will definitely be better prepared next time round

As it stands, our intention is to have further meetings as more guidance comes out from the RFU about the Return to Play and especially around off field activity, so it is important that we get this right.

These are some of the options that we are looking at.

- 1 Asking clubs to limit the number of attendees to two per club
- 2 Run two meetings. One to start at 7pm and one at 8pm, maybe splitting it by groups. So South and West Clubs at 7pm North and North West Clubs at 8pm for instance













3 Change from one All Clubs Meeting open to all we run three meetings split between 1. Adult 2. Age Group. 3 Women and Girls

4 Run separate meetings for Chairs and Hon Sec, then adult playing and then Age Group

At the same time Eddie Keal and Charles Portsmouth have been looking at the option of upgrading the County Zoom Account to increase the numbers that can join meetings

Clearly this would ensure that everybody that wants to get on a meetings can but I also take Eddie's point "However, the real question is," Should we?" 150 is too many for them all to interact."

So, some issues to be sorted out as we arrange further meetings

Anyway I just wanted to say thank you to the people who did so much to make it all happen

First of all, to Louise who did such an outstanding job on the night facilitating the meeting notwithstanding all the work she put in preparing for evening. A top effort.
