Update from Lou Latter – Chair of Rugby Development

A big thank you and shout out to all Middlesex Clubs for completing their annual safeguarding audit. We had 100% completion again.

Age Grade registrations still need to be completed across both the boys and girls age grade teams but are still down on last year. Please do ensure that parents are confirming registration via their GMS profiles. If you need support with GMS then please visit [Community Rugby Help \(opens in a new tab\)](#), where additional support and guidance has been added. You can find answers to common questions, view latest updates, or submit a help request.

The [Middlesex Financial Support Fund](#) is now closed. We were able to support 61 applications with over £9,000 paid out to support age grade players to continue playing rugby.

A final call for clubs to sign up to the RFU [Volunteer Recruitment Programme](#) which gives clubs the opportunity to apply for £500 of funding and access a range of resources to help plan and deliver a volunteer recruitment activity aimed at creating new opportunities to recruit volunteers; raise awareness of volunteer opportunities to new audiences; and embed volunteer management in your club's working practices. Applications deadline is Friday 24th November.

We will be running a Girls Club Forum meeting on 21st November at 19:30. If you have not registered, please do so by using this [link](#).

Look out for information coming shortly regarding a boys U13/U14 and girls U14 festival in February in partnership with the London Irish Foundation. This is the first year that Middlesex will partner with the festival and is open to all Middlesex clubs.

We will be sending out the annual Facilities Audit in the coming weeks. A reminder that all clubs are asked to complete this so we can support you with any facilities needs and ensure you receive information around funding that is available.

Message from Andrew Smart, Chair of Competitions

I thought it might be interesting to start by looking at how the adult male game is faring nationally so far this season following on from the problems of the last few years which we know has seen a marked change in the playing habits of a significant number of our players across the community game and a significant increase in the number of matches not being played.

So, let's look at the figures to see if those problems are continuing into this season. For the leagues I am working to the figures provided weekly by RFU's whilst for the merit tables I am working to the figures provided by the RFU for all 113 Merit Tables and our own returns in particular.

The RFU works on completion rates, which is the number of games organised at the beginning of the

season in both the leagues and merit tables and are taken from the GMS, against the number of games played including postponements, walkovers and abandoned games.

So far, the completion rate for the leagues is consistent at 95% against 91% at the same time last season and 89% at the end of the season. This season's completion rate will increase significantly provided any postponed and abandoned games are ultimately played. This weekend for instance there was 1.7% walkover rate across the whole country out of 507 matches.

With the merit tables the figures have increased significantly on last season where at the end, 119 MTs were showing a completion rate of 59%. The number of MTs across the country are this season down to 113 (Indeed we have lost one of ours) but the completion rate is at 79% some 12 points up for the same time last season and 20% up on where they finished. Our Merit Tables, at this time last season we were also at 59% which have gone up to 77% this season and are 85.56% if you look solely at games played against walkovers. There is no doubt that local flexibility and some decisions we took across the summer have largely resulted in those excellent figures for us but they are also being replicated across the country, vastly improved on last season.

So, about a third of the way into the season and despite the fears that the World Cup would see an impact on availability of players and with it, games played have proved unfounded. Yes, clubs lost players, but fixtures were honoured and whilst it is far too early to suggest we have turned a corner the figures are very encouraging and it would perhaps fair to say we are seeing some green shoots of recovery.

Onto our clubs. In the Championship Ealing Trailfinders after four rounds are the only unbeaten team in the league, top with by four points whilst London Scottish are bottom with no points

At level 5 in Regional 1 South, after ten rounds, London Welsh have dropped to fourth, CS Stags 1863 remain at sixth and Hammersmith and Fulham in their first season at this level are seventh

At level 6, in Regional 2 SE, also after ten rounds, London Cornish have dropped into the relegation zone at eleventh. In Regional 2 Thames, H.A.C remain second, undefeated but with two draws leaving them six points behind the leaders. Belsize Park up into third, Old Priorians remain fourth, Grasshoppers, who had initially struggled have now won three in a row and move up to seventh. Old Habs, have dropped to tenth Early days but at the moment, Fullerians are eleventh and in a relegation spot which is a worry. Any Hertfordshire or Middlesex side that gets relegated from a level 6 league this season, into Counties 1 H/M, will create an extra relegation into the leagues below.

At level 7, in Counties 1 Essex, after nine rounds Epping Upper Clapton are second only on points difference. In Counties 1 H/M London Scottish are top by three points having won eight in a row, Finchley drop to fourth, Old Streetonians up from 9th to fifth, Ruislip drop to seventh, Hackney drop to ninth, Enfield Ignatians remain eleventh with Hampstead bottom. In Counties 1 Surrey/Sussex Teddington continue on from last season, undefeated with maximum points and top by six. Twickenham remain sixth.

At level 8 in Counties 2 H/M after seven rounds (a ten-team league) Ealing Trailfinders are now the only undefeated side six point clear of Brunel University with maximum points 187. Then Wasps FC remain third, Old Millhillians up to fourth and Harrow fifth all on the same points, Saracens Amateurs drop to seventh, with Hendon bottom,

At level 9, in Counties 3 H/M after eight rounds Bank Lane go up to second, U.C.S up to fourth, Finsbury Park drop to seventh Actonians drop to ninth, Thamesians drop to tenth, Kilburn Cosmos up

to eleventh but with a game in hand and Uxbridge bottom. In Counties 3 Surrey London Exiles drop to ninth.

At level 10, in Counties 4 Surrey after seven rounds, Old Hamptonians are top with Old Paulines down to third, Harlequin Amateurs up to fifth and whilst Staines remain bottom, they have now honoured their last three fixtures and won for the first time on Saturday so very well done to them. After really struggling to get out for the first few games they have shown real resilience and all the first to them for it.

At level 11 Counties 5 Surrey, after seven rounds, London French are up to fourth.

In my last report I noted a concern that already six Middlesex clubs have been unable to honour league fixtures so far this season and have had to concede walkovers to their opponents. That unfortunately has gone up to seventh but to be fair whilst a couple are still struggling to honour their fixtures, the majority of others are looking more resilient. One we I need to continue to monitor but perhaps better now than for my last report.

Early days I know but the figures locally for both leagues and merit tables continue to look better.

Report from Chair of Groups, Andrew Smart

We are currently right in the middle of the November round of Group meetings with the South held last Monday at Teddington, the North West on Zoom on Wednesday. This Monday we have the North Group meeting at Finchley with the West on Monday 27th on Zoom.

The feedback so far this season has been pretty positive with most clubs reporting more consistent fixtures and less walkovers than last season. The issues around Dual Registration for next season which cause much disquiet in the September Group meetings I believe have been pretty much put to bed for the majority of our clubs. I will be in a better position to report after the December Council meeting but it should be good news as I understand it

The Pickup The Whistle Course for the North Group at Grammarians is now full but we still have plenty of places for the North West Group at Harrow on the 23rd and 30th January 2024. In the usual run of weekly matches most of you don't want to be hearing from me! However, I have been asked to make periodic reports about the discipline process that goes on for those unfortunate to bump into us during the season.

Actually some clubs do seem to like to engage with your Discipline Secretary, and it was a particular pleasure to share lunch at Feltham RFC ahead of their recent match which featured so well on Youtube, and is currently on the RFU webpage. How excellent to see a club taking a pride in all the values of the game, that we in the background running discipline are working to also maintain. Thank you, Greg!

Pre-season all clubs get a briefing with reminders. If you want this sent again, do email me. Our up-to-date processes are described in brief on the webpage, which should be your first port of call for anything in this area. (<https://middlesexrugby.com/county/committees/discipline/>). The RFU have the current regulations on englandrugby.com.

So how has your season been?
I am asked that question by other Discipline Secretaries across the country in our monthly meets and, comparing notes with the other CBs, it is clear that the season has not been too good here or across the country. In Middlesex we have already had as many cases as we had in the whole of last season.

What deductions can I make from the cases so far?
Well one thing is for sure, the Domestic Law Variations have not led directly to any cases. Tackles which come under the DLVs may have resulted in penalties (but often managed without penalty very well by referees) and have not resulted in cards. It also seems that with attention being paid to DLVs, players have avoided the proportion of tackles "in the same head-space" we saw last year. This is most encouraging.

What is less encouraging is the increase in cases as a whole. Strikes (punch/head-butt type offences) and tackles (beyond horizontal and still some upright/no dip tackles) are the bulk of cases. Players, these are all avoidable!

Citing and *VEO*
 With many clubs using VEO, we have seen the footage used in more citing incidents involving foul play (strike, stamp, dangerous tackle, head-butt). Sometimes VEO is clear and covers the incident well, but VEO is not designed for the forensic type of analysis we sometimes have to endure at international rugby. Clubs should always check the incident is “clear and obvious” on the footage before proceeding. Also be aware that there is a non-negotiable 7 day deadline for all the citing paperwork to be completed by the club making a citing.

This season I have received papers for 22 cases this season so far. A few of these are recent and awaiting a hearing. Please be aware that unless the RFU tariff for the offence is 4 or fewer matches, then we do hear all cases in person. I can only note that for some of you a hearing in Twickenham may not be too convenient, but there is a simple answer to that!

Some reminders:

- Clubs must notify me of all red cards within 48 hours of the incident. This is at all levels and ages. It does not matter whether it is a society referee appointment or not.
- Youth cases should also be reported, and our Age Grade Discipline Secretary will help clubs/schools through that process. There have been significant changes here for this season. Caron Evans-Evans details are on the webpage.
- Once a player is sent off then he/she cannot play until there is a hearing.
- We will not tolerate situations where a referee reports that he was “encouraged” not to submit a report after a red card. The process has to work through, and clubs trying to circumvent this offer themselves up to charges under Rule 5.12.


Finally, can I encourage all in the game to work together to give me a bit freer time, and less hearing planning and calling clubs into meetings. I long for a quiet life now I can’t run about with a whistle every Saturday! Our referees are doing the best they can, but sometimes players just force their hand by “losing it” on the pitch – let’s all have a serious think about game values and avoid tarnishing your club or the match you are playing in.

So, it's very gratifying when we receive feedback as detailed below for the recent Grasshoppers Under 14's tour. And whilst this element of what we do, on the face of it looks a bit like red tape. In reality, by working together the outcome is well worth the extra diligence.
