President's Corner

The County President, Nigel Orton shares his Middlesex travels and encounters:

19 Oct: Whitton Lions 1 v Ruislip 2. A Middx MT Div 2 match. The referee was Hugh Tippett (LSRFUR), assessor Clive Roberts (Finchley RFC). The result was 17 – 14 pts. My thanks to Whitton's (WL) co-chairs and joint coaches, James Bowman and Andi Williams for hosting my visit.



WL were formed 12 years ago and are settled in at Whitton Park, which was once the 18th century estate of the 3rd Duke of Argyll. He had an exotic tree collection that after his passing were moved to what is now Kew Gardens. The park was later sold for housing and the playing field was the base for Old Latymerians' sports.



It was a very tight game that entertained the supporters. Whitton's forwards had the edge in the scrum and had some good line attacks. Both teams had strong defences, and both moved the ball wide at pace.



The Ruislip captain was DJ Willis (4), John Scullion was coaching. DJ, Nick Karayiannis and Killain Griffith had good performances. WL's captain was Angus Collie (7), players of note included Lawrence Riekstins (14), Duke Ashworth (11 'man of the match'), Richard Gregory (13) and Angus. The front row of Cameron Shilstone (3) who scored the winning try, Lewis Maiella (1) and Henry Loarridge (2) were solid together and dominating.

This was a hard fought match, with strong defensive play and excellent tackling. Belsize's pack had the edge, I felt, and both sets of backs ran good moves. For me, Park's Ben Stanton (10 + captain), Tom Lewis (5), James Tilley (4) and Jimmy Strainge (2) all played very well. The coaches were Conor Carey (ex-Ireland U20, Connacht, Worcester N'hampton Saints prop) and Dan Leavy (ex-Leinster and Ireland flanker).



My thanks To BPK's Director of Rugby, James Lindsay and Conor for making me feel welcome. Perhaps the bigger buzz was on an adjacent pitch where Park's 3s were playing London New Zealand who had All Black brothers, Beauden Jordie and Scott Barrett, cheering on from the touchline. That was a Mx MT Premier Division fixture, won by Park 10 – 0 pts.



Formed in 1871, Belsize Park RFC run five men's sides in the leagues and merit tables, a vets XV plus two women's XVs. Regent's Park Royals act as the junior and minis' affiliate club. Matches are played by The Hub in Regent's Park and training in Russell Square, giving them the claim to be "London's most central rugby club." This club has more players and teams than most and we wish them well for the rest of their season.









Off Pitch: Ian Swindale turned 90 years old in July, and this was celebrated at Upper Clapton RFC where he is a long serving member. Update from Fred Cracknell - Chair of Rugby Development (on the field)

October saw me back on the pitch myself, playing 2 games for CS and once in a charity game for the Brave Mind Lions with fellow board member Mark Coles.

Despite a false start to refereeing at Harrow, I did manage to watch the U16s play Hampstead, have a good tour of the club - including the fantastic gym facilities - and have a really interesting conversation about the work Harrow are doing with local schools. Harrow work with a 3rd party to deliver an activity session for local schools hosted at the club. They use this as a springboard into the club but also to create what was described as a "Freddie Flintoff Field of Dreams" style team, with the schools competing against each other at the end of the programme. It's really interesting learning how different clubs approach the challenge of engaging their local schools. I will document the various approaches to help other clubs in the County that want to engage the schools around them. I ultimately think if we're going to grow rugby in the County there has to be a best practice model to bring children into our clubs having had positive rugby experiences at their schools.

I managed to get up to Hendon to discuss recruitment. We looked at a few quick wins and I owe the guys some follow up actions! It'd be great to see Hendon competing in the leagues again in the not too distant.

Former CS director of Rugby Chris Swann joined me on my visit to Hendon and off the back of it, he has agreed to support the County in a new role focusing on Rugby Sustainability. We are still fleshing out what this will look like and where Chris' experience and expertise will be best placed, but the general premise is to create a structure which ensures the longevity of our clubs. Great to have you onboard Chris!

I also had a good catch up with Peter and Steve from Hackney Rugby Club and we talked at length about the growth of the game, especially for minis and junior girls. (Another 2 people I owe follow up actions to!) This again comes back to ensuring there is a route for children from schools into the clubs, particularly as we all want to capitalize on the funding and delivery effort from the RFU in the T1 rollout to schools.

So good news for Peter and Steve and everyone else involved in girls' rugby across the County, Caz Henzell has agreed to support us as the Girls' Rugby Lead. Caz plays herself at Hammersmith and Fulham and has lots of experience running competitions including her current efforts to get a City Women's 7s Competition off the ground. Caz will work with Kesha at the RFU to develop the current junior offering and ultimately return its running to the County. The first phase of this will be a virtual town hall in December to get a temperature check on how the season is going - I will share details of this in the coming weeks. We are also looking to broaden our mini's offering for girls to try and grow the engagement before U12s with the aim of more clubs being able to have standalone teams and girls being able to play rugby at their clubs rather than having to travel from U12s. Welcome to the team Caz!

Unfortunately, personal commitments mean I'm away most weekends in November, but I look forward to getting back around the clubs in December and playing as much as I can for CS.

As always, any comments or questions are welcome. Any willing volunteers are very welcome. And if you'd like to talk to me about what's going on at your club, you're short of a referee on a Sunday, or you need or want anything from the County, please do get in touch.

Message from Andrew Smart, Chair of **Competitions**

I start with the vote on Lower XV.

The RFU have now confirmed the results of the Lower XVs vote that took place between Wednesday 8th October to Friday 25th to the following question Do you support Lower XV teams from your CB joining the RFU Leagues?

In relation to the Middlesex Vote

Yes - Five Clubs. No - Thirty-Seven Clubs

Of the forty-two Middlesex Clubs that recorded a vote, 88.1% voted no and 11.9% voted yes, far outreaching the 66% required to continue to opt out

A further two clubs voted outside the windows and as such their voted whilst noted were not added to final return

Across the Country

2 CBs (Essex & Lancashire) elected not to have a vote, nor were they triggered to do so by 10% of their clubs asking for a vote to be held.

The other 6 CBs (apart from us) all offered a vote to their voting clubs.

For the national policy of allowing Lower XVs to be included in the RFU leagues then any vote must have over 66.6% "No" votes.

Surrey: 51 votes - **Yes** 11.8% **No** 88.2%

Durham: 20 votes -Yes 30% No 70%

East Midlands: 19 votes - Yes 57.9% No 42.1%

16 Northumberland: votes

- Yes 12.5% No 87.5%

Yorkshire: 58 votes - Yes 27.6% No 72.4%

Sussex: 20 Votes - Yes 9 45% No 11 55%

We are now in the application window across the country for those clubs that wish to put their lower xvs into the league system for next season. This includes our clubs although they will not be able to play in our leagues if accepted but have to find a place in a CB run league that allows Lower XVS.

From recent discussions with Hertfordshire, it is clear that the decision of Middlesex clubs will lead to a split across our three counties leagues for the 2025/26 season onwards

At this stage with promotion into and relegation from the regional leagues, to take into

consideration together with the possibility that some Hertfordshire Clubs might look to play to continue to play their rugby with us and whether some of those clubs now playing in Surrey leagues partly because of the travel into Herts will want to return it is simply impossible at the moment for us to consider how our leagues will look for next season.

I should also add that the eleven Middlesex Clubs who are currently playing outside our CB's boundaries, will all continue to play their rugby free of Lower XVs, with no change in the positions of both Essex and Surrey.

There is no doubt that the break of our longstanding relationship with Hertfordshire will have a significant impact on our own leagues going forward. However, the decision has been made and now we have to manage around it

Anyway, for most of us it is the rugby being played that we are most interested in thank goodness. So here we are

In the Championship after five rounds Ealing remain second but now only two points behind Coventry. London Scottish after some difficult years remain seventh.

At level 5 in Regional 1 South Central after eight rounds and after a fantastic try bonus point victory away at Jersey are now ahead of the Channel Island Club by five points with CS Stags 1863 dropping to fifth with Hammersmith and Fulham dropping to eleventh although they picked up only their second win of the season on Saturday at home to mid table Maidenhead

At level six in Regional 2 Thames, again after eighth rounds London Scottish Lions are now top H.A.C are currently third two points. Belsize Park up to fourth only four off top, Grasshoppers drop to sixth, Old Priorians remain seventh, Teddington, after a slow start, are up to eighth whilst Old Haberdashers winless remain bottom and ten points away from safety.













At level seven in Counties 1 Sussex/Surrey again after eight rounds Twickenham drop to third only four points behind the leaders whilst London Cornish remain sixth. In Counties 1 Essex again after eight rounds Epping Upper Clapton jump up to seventh. In Counties 1 Herts/Middx, Finchley in their Centenary Season remain top after eight rounds with maximum points, with Brunel University in second place five points behind, with Ealing Trailfinders 1871, fourth two points behind them, Old Streetonians remain fifth, Ruislip seventh, Chiswick from tenth to eight with Hackney dropping a place to eleventh.

At level eight in Counties 2 Herts/Middx at level eight also after eight rounds, Wasps FC are now top one point ahead of both Hampstead and Saracens Amateurs, Harrow are fifth, Wasps U.C.S. sixth, Old Millhillians eighth, Enfield after their first win of the season up to tenth.

At level nine in Counties 3 Herts/Middx after six rounds Thamesians are top by one point but having played a game more than second placed Royston, Actonians up to fourth, Finsbury Park drop to fifth, Kilburn Cosmos up to seventh and Mill Hill on their return to the leagues ninth and so far, winless. In Counties 3 Surrey after seven rounds Old Hamptonians are top by only one point whilst London Exiles drop to ninth

At level ten in Counties 4 Surrey, after six rounds, Harlequin Amateurs go up one place to fifth, Old Paulines ninth and London French bottom and tenth with only one point between the two clubs

At level eleven in Counties 5 Surrey after six rounds, Staines undefeated and on maximum points are top by three points with Feltham on their return to the leagues remain in fifth

In the Middlesex Merit Tables Premier Division after five rounds NZ Kiwis drop to second with London Sussex dropping to eight although with two games in hand.

In MMT1 after six rounds London Japanese drop to second whilst Quintin drop to in fifth.

In MMT2 West London, with a game in hand, remain in second place after six rounds, Haringey Rhinos drop to fourth, Whitton Lions up to fifth, Old Isleworthians drop to eighth, Hanwell ninth.

In MMT3 after four rounds, Ickenham go up to eighth and Northolt ninth. Uxbridge who have not been able to get out at all so far this season have now been removed from the Merit table

In the Herts and Middlesex MTs Championship South after six rounds Old Grammarians after two successive defeats drop to second. In Merit Table South 1 after five rounds Pinner & Grammarians are first, by five points. Southgate up to 2nd equal whilst Hendon drop to sixth.

In the Premiership Women's Rugby after five rounds Saracens Women's drop to third Harlequins Women up to fifth whilst Ealing Trailfinders Women drop to sixth

Just an update on the Community Rugby Support Fund for 2024/25 which has now closed and clubs

who did apply should by now have had a letter from the RFU to confirm the awarding of their grant

Simply to be eligible you had to be

- 1 A Voting Club of the RFU
- 2 Have an annual turnover for last year of less than £125,000-
- 3 Complete the application (takes no more than one minute)

As I have previously noted only three Middlesex Clubs applied last year and all three got the full grant

I am delighted to say that with pushing from the County we have managed this year to get that up to twenty-six. Of course, I appreciate that some of our clubs would not have been eligible for the grant because their turnover for last year was above the £125k- threshold but I still believe that a significant number of our clubs still didn't make use of this opportunity.

Still twenty-six is better than three and we will look to improve on those number next year.

If any club that did apply this year and still have not received any confirmation from the RFU, can you please come back to me and I will chase on your behalf. As one of the clubs responded after they were informed that they had been awarded £500-"I'll be paying more attention to all your emails!"

So, a win all round.....

Update from Chair of Team Middlesex - Mark Coles

Hello, its November already (I know!) and I hope this finds you and your club well. The season is flying and we're already into the autumn internationals.













Regarding Representative rugby, our first games are kicking off in December and we've had a flurry of activity across our age group teams assessments and subsequent initial training sessions and discussions with potential coaches for the vacancies I spoke about last month am looking to fill.

In Age Grade, in all we had 409 young people nominated for our four programmes with 164 taken to the next stages of our programme. We were particularly pleased with the continued year on year growth in the number of girls on our U18's programme and exponential growth in the number of boys we were lucky enough to assess over the sessions. The growth in the latter has been in no small part due to the demise of the London Irish academv and shifting of boundaries Harlequins/Saracens which shows the value these programmes bring in given young people a stage to showcase their talents.

For those that were unsuccessful this time I am also proud we've been able to give players individual feedback so they can keep developing and highlighted the fact they are welcome back to the respective age bracket assessments they find themselves in next year. Whilst this is no doubt disappointing, I have seen first-hand that parents and players alike appreciate the effort that has gone into providing so a doth of the hat to Jok Dunbar who has led on this means of engagement is certainly in order.

Turning towards the adult age groups, we've identified a Head Coach for the Senior Women's team who I think will be a real asset to the programme based on discussions with and anecdotal feedback we have received. We've also made strides on the U20 leadership team front and I'm hopeful of formally announcing both in the December newsletter update. We really do have some enthusiastic, passionate people in our midst and I am keen to bring them into our programmes to complement their rugby journeys if the enthusiasm and opportunities are there.

In recent days we have received the U20s fixtures (see below full grid of dates) and are awaiting the Senior Men's and Women's so we can push on with discussing those campaigns with the leadership teams.

Next month, I'm hoping to update on the progress we will have made on the above appointments, share updates on the games we have been playing and more details on the open age programmes, but for now thanks as ever for reading and for your support.
